

Challenges and Problems of Transgender

The term transgender refers to people whose sense of their own gender differs from what would be expected based on the sex characteristics with which they were born. 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I. INTRODUCTION

Transgender is an umbrella term for persons whose gender identity, gender expression or behaviour does not conform to that typically associated with the sex to which they were assigned at birth. Gender identity refers to a person's internal sense of being male, female or something else, gender expression refers to the way a person communicates gender identity to others through behaviour, clothing, hairstyles, and voice or body characteristics. "Trans" is sometimes used as shorthand for "transgender." While transgender is generally a good term to use, not everyone whose appearance or behaviour is gendernonconforming will identify as a transgender person. Being transgender is not a mental disorder. It cannot be "cured" with treatment. The society treatsthem in a bad manner such as avoiding the people and some people are using bad words for calling these people.

The people get hurts by the way of such activities. Only few persons are having soft attitudes towards transgender people. But most of the general public get afraid and tease the transgender people.

III. METHODOLOGY
